Request - You asked us the following:

I am writing with a request under the Freedom of Information Act. Specifically, I would like to ask the following:

- In the calendar years 2022, 2023, 2024 and 2025, how many cyclists were fined by your force for dangerous cycling? Please break this down by year.
- In the same calendar years, how many people were issued fines for cycling under the influence of alcohol? Please break this down by year.
- In the same years, how many illegal e-bikes were seized by your force? Please break this down by year.
- In the same years, how many incidents of a pedestrian being struck by a cyclist were recorded by your force? Please break this down by year and include the number of fatalities.

We received your request on 04/12/2025 and have processed this under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA).

Staffordshire Police's response to your enquiry is as follows:

In accordance with Section 17(1) of the Freedom of Information Act, this letter represents a refusal notice for this particular request.

The following exemption has been applied:

- Section 12(1) where the cost of compliance exceeds the appropriate limit.
- Section 12(1) does not oblige a public authority to comply with a request for information if the authority estimates that the cost of complying with the request would exceed the prescribed limit'.

The above information has been withheld for the following reasons:

There is no method by which SP can readily retrieve information from their systems to answer this request. For the time period requested, there have been in excess of 47,210 seized items, with no detail of the seized item being readily searchable. Therefore, in order to ascertain if the item seized was an 'e-bike' the record for each item would require a manual review.

Furthermore, in order to ascertain how many incidents of pedestrians being struck by a cyclist, all road traffic collisions would need to be reviewed. To extract this data would therefore require a very labour-intensive manual trawl through each record. There have been in excess of 38,430 road traffic collisions which would need to be reviewed.

From dip sampling, it has been estimated that it would take approximately 5 minutes per record and per question to determine if this conforms with your request. To review each record to answer this request, this would equate to over 7,136 hours. To achieve this task would therefore exceed the 18-hour time and cost threshold of the FOI Act by some considerable margin.



Advice and assistance

In relation to question 1 and 2, the answer to both questions is nil.

Freedom of Information Request Appeals Procedure

1. Who Can Ask for a Review

Any person who has requested information from Staffordshire Police, which has been dealt with under the Freedom of Information Act, is entitled to complain and request an internal review, if they are dissatisfied with the response they received.

2. How to Request a Review

Requests for review of a Freedom of Information request must be made in writing within two months of the date of receipt of this email, and should be addressed to:

The reference number, date of the request and details of why the review is being requested must be included. Requests for review should be brought to the attention of the Information Access Team within two months of the Force's response to the original FOI request.

3. Review Procedure

Receipt of a request for review will be acknowledged in writing. The review will be conducted by a Supervisor who is independent from the original Decision Maker. The Information Access Team will set a target date for a response. The response will be made as soon as is practicable with the intention to complete the review within 20 working days. In more complex cases the review may take up to 40 working days.

The independent Supervisor will conduct a review of the handling of the request for information and of decisions taken, including decisions taken about where the public interest lies in respect of exempt information where applicable. The review enables a re-evaluation of the case, taking into account the matters raised by the complaint.



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4. Conclusion of the Appeal

On completion of the review the Independent Supervisor will reply to the appellant with the result of the review. If the appellant is still dissatisfied following the review they should contact the Information Commissioner to make an appeal. The Information Commissioner can be contacted via the following link:
