Request - You asked Staffordshire Police (SP) the following:

1 . AI technology confirmation: Confirmation that your force currently utilises AI-enabled road safety camera technology e.g. automated trailer, gantry or van mounted systems for detecting mobile phone or seatbelt offences). And was this technology operational during Easter bank holiday 2025 (18th-21st April 2025)?

2 .Traffic offence volume: For each of the four-day periods listed below, please state the total number of driving offences recorded, and the total number of these that resulted in a fine or Notice of Intended Prosecution (NIP):

- 15th-18th March 2024
- 29th March-1st April 2024
- 4th-7th April 2025
- 18th-21st April 2025

3 .NIP or TOR Split: For the data provided in question 2, please provide a breakdown of how many were NIPs (typically camera-detected) and how many were Traffic Offence Reports (TORs - typically officer-led)?

(Note: For questions 2 and 3 please provide the data in an Excel/CSV document format with rows for each time period, and columns for the specific counts.)

4 .Top 10 Car Analysis: For Easter bank holiday 2025 (18th-21st April 2025) period, please provide a summary table showing the total count of the top 10 most-fined car makes and models e.g. Ford Fiesta, Volkswagen Golf etc. Note - I am seeking anonymised data volumes (counts) for each make/model rather than individual registration numbers.

SP received your request on 13/02/2026 and have processed this under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA).

SP's response to your enquiry is as follows:

SP holds the requested information.

- 1 . AI technology confirmation: Confirmation that your force currently utilises AI-enabled road safety camera technology e.g. automated trailer, gantry or van mounted systems for detecting mobile phone or seatbelt offences). – **Disclosed, SP do not currently utilise AI camera technology.**

Please be advised that all Officer led speed offences for question 3 will have resulted in an NIP (Notice of Intended Prosecution).

Please note that this data has been provided to the best of the ability of SP, subject to the limitation of current recording protocols and systems/software. Additional offences may have been recorded during these timescales but are awaiting finalisation and input onto these systems and would not be present within this dataset.

Every effort is made to ensure that the data presented is accurate and complete. However, it is important to note that this has been extracted from multiple sources, developed for specific policing purposes, for which data extraction methods have not been specifically designed to directly correlate with the terminology of this request. Therefore, the data presented is subject to the inaccuracies and idiosyncrasies inherent in any large-scale recording system.

Consequently, care should be taken in the interpretation and presentation of this data, to not misrepresent the whole or any part of the data disclosed.

Please be advised that all Freedom of Information request responses are published on the SP website although personal details are not included.

Freedom of Information Request Appeals Procedure

1. Who Can Ask for a Review

Any person who has requested information from SP, which has been dealt with under the Freedom of Information Act, is entitled to complain and request an internal review, if they are dissatisfied with the response they received.



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2. How to Request a Review

Requests for review of a Freedom of Information request must be made in writing within two months of the date of receipt of this email, and should be addressed to:

The reference number, date of the request and details of why the review is being requested must be included. Requests for review should be brought to the attention of the Information Access Team within two months of the SP response to the original FOI request.

3. Review Procedure

Receipt of a request for review will be acknowledged in writing. The review will be conducted by a supervisor who is independent from the original Decision Maker. The Information Access Team will set a target date for a response. The response will be made as soon as is practicable with the intention to complete the review within twenty working days. In more complex cases the review may take up to forty working days.

The independent supervisor will conduct a review of the handling of the request for information and of decisions taken, including decisions taken about where the public interest lies in respect of exempt information where applicable. The review enables a re-evaluation of the case, considering the matters raised by the complaint.

4. Conclusion of the Appeal

On completion of the review the independent supervisor will reply to the appellant with the result of the review. If the appellant is still dissatisfied following the review they should contact the Information Commissioner to make an appeal.
